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Reading the Book of Acts

We have celebrated the glory of Easter. The stone has been rolled away. We are now in the midst of the great fifty days of Easter. You may have noticed that our scripture lessons on Sunday mornings have taken an interesting shift. The Old Testament lesson has been replaced by a reading from the Acts of the Apostles. In addition, Stefanie and I are regularly preaching on the book of Acts during this season. Why?

The book of Acts is an interesting book of the Bible. We are not always sure what to make of it. It is not a Gospel like Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John. It is not a letter like the Epistles of St. Paul, St. Peter, or St. James. It is not a sermon like Hebrews or prophecy like the Revelation. Acts seems like a book of history—a narrative which tells us how the earliest followers of Jesus lived, organized themselves, and spread out with their message across the known world. But the history we read in Acts does not always match up with the accounts we read in other places in the New Testament. We call the book “The Acts of the Apostles” but is that the best name for it? It is only about a couple of Apostles. Most of the original twelve don’t show up in the book. The first half of the book is about Peter. The second half is about Paul. Mixed in we get some cameo appearances from James. We are also introduced to new people who were not apostles. So what is Acts?

Acts is actually the second part of a two-volume work of literature. Volume one is the Gospel of Luke. The same author who wrote Luke also wrote Acts. They were intended to be read together as a consistent narrative. The two volumes—Luke and Acts—have a consistent theology, style, and message. Both books were written to a person named Theophilus (there are many theories on the identity of Theophilus, but those are beyond the scope of this article). Some have argued that Luke is the story of Jesus and that Acts is the story of the Holy Spirit. Acts is not actually intended to be a book of history. Rather, Luke wrote Acts as a book of theology—but that theology is told on the stage of history. The book is far more interested in theology than history. Of course,

we do learn a great deal of history from Acts, but history is not the primary goal.

Acts is a bridge between the Gospels and the Epistles of the New Testament. Acts reveals how the followers of Jesus were transformed and empowered



by the Holy Spirit; how they spread out sharing the Good News of God in Christ. Acts shows how the church came to be and how it ordered itself. Acts explains how this group of Jesus’ disciples came to be the new community

God always intended. Without reading Acts we cannot hope to understand the rest of the New Testament. In fact, without reading Acts, we cannot fully comprehend the story of Salvation presented through the entire Bible. That means the story told from Genesis to Revelation cannot be comprehended without reading Acts! It is Acts that connects the Old Testament to the New and the Gospels to the Epistles. Finally, Acts reveals what it means to be witnesses for Christ—a task still included in every Christian’s job description.

So that is why we read this book in the season of Easter. Both because it connects the glorious events of the Gospels to the remaining portions of scripture, and because at the end of the Gospel stories, Jesus tells his followers that we are to be his witnesses to the entire world. But for Episcopalians this can be a scary thought. It brings us to the “E” word that so many tend to fear: Evangelism.

In our baptismal covenant we vow to “Proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ.” This is our post-Easter mission given to us by the Risen Christ. But the idea of evangelism makes us uncomfortable. It brings to mind those who knock on doors or hand out tracts. We think of those who are always trying to convince everyone to believe the way they believe. We conjure up images of those who are self-righteous and who tell everyone to repent or burn. But that is not

what evangelism really is.

Evangelism is nothing more than the willingness to share your story of gratitude for God’s grace in your life. It is based on our deep delight in the community of the church and our love for God. It is grounded on the understanding that God loves each and every person—after all, the criteria for being God’s beloved is to be born a human being.

We never know what might happen when we have the opportunity to share our stories of gratitude for God’s grace in our lives. This is a spiritual practice so our trust must be in the Holy Spirit. We don’t have any hidden agenda. Our goal in being witnesses to God’s amazing love is not that someone will convert or even that they will join St. Michael’s. Our job is to be witnesses. The best way to do that is by sharing our stories. The Holy Spirit is present and active in the lives of people. We never know what may happen. Perhaps your story will touch another’s heart. Perhaps your sharing will encourage them. Maybe that person will want to know more about the faith. Maybe someone will want to come to St. Michael’s and join the community. Maybe any number of things will happen. But what happens when we share the Good News of God in Christ and our delight in God’s grace is not our business. That is God’s job. Only God knows why you were there to share with that particular person at that particular time. We have no way of knowing what God is doing in another person’s life. Our role is to be witnesses. That means sharing our stories of gratitude for God’s grace in our lives. The Spirit’s role is to do the rest.

The Acts of the Apostles is filled with tales of people sharing their stories of God’s grace in Jesus Christ. In Acts, the Holy Spirit uses those moments to do amazing things. As we read the book of Acts this year, let us remember Christ’s call to be his witnesses. Let us no longer fear the “E” word. After all, we are only telling our stories of God’s grace to those we love.
